







# MEET MY PATRIOTS Presented by Carroll Reinert "MY AMERICAN REVOLUTION ANCESTORS"



My SAR ancestor was Hugh Caldwell, Jr. He was born February 7,1759 in Lancaster Co., Pennsylvania, so he was only 18 when he fought in the battles of Brandywine and Germantown. He was a Private in the Lancaster County Pennsylvania militia from Martick Township, in the 7th Company of the 6th battalion, James Watson's Company. Hugh, Jr., married Jane Boyd who was born June 23, 1766 and died April 11, 1848. They had eight children. Hugh, Jr. died October 20, 1829 in Clearfield County, Pennsylvania. He and his wife are buried in the Centre Cemetery,



Hyde, Clearfield County, Pennsylvania.

In the last Newsletter I wrote about the battle at Brandywine. This article concerns the battle of Germantown in which my ancestor also participated in. On October 4th, Washington launched a complicated attack involving the advance of four columns of troops, moving at night with orders to converge on Germantown and simultaneously attack the British at dawn. Some hundred British ran and hid in the Cliveden house, a large stone building, and returned fire from the second story. Cliveden was the country home of Pennsylvania Chief Justice Benjamin Chew. With the British on the run, Washington was tempted to leave Cliveden in his rear. Henry Knox, Washington's artillery officer, advised against it. To an artillery officer, there is nothing more tempting than a stationary target. On October 4, 1777 over 70 colonial soldiers died on these grounds. The British lost only three at Cliveden.

While Knox bombarded Cliveden in an attempt to gain a British surrender, one of Washington's four columns was attracted by the firing and changed direction. In the heavy fog, the column opened fire on the rear of the other American column. With mass confusion, and no hope for a coordinated attack, Washington ordered a general retreat to White Marsh. Although Germantown was an American defeat, it was also a success. The Americans learned that the main body of the British army

was not invulnerable and that they could successfully launch an attack against it. The lessons learned at Germantown as well as the American victory at Saratoga later, helped the French to come to America's aid. On that very same day, General Washington force-marched his troops 25 miles back to where they had started, the night before, again without food or sleep. In the overall battle of Germantown American losses were over 1,100, while the British suffered only 500. Yet, the Battle of Germantown was an American Victory of sorts. The British allowed Washington to escape and even to spend the winter of 1777-1778 at Valley Forge, where he regrouped and brought in Baron Wilhelm Von Steuben and his Prussians from Germany for support. France admired the American plan that failed at Germantown. They were also pleased with the English defeat at Saratoga, New York, several days later. These two battles helped bring the French into the Revolution on America's side. In retrospect, the battle of Germantown may have been the end of Washington's rough beginning and the beginning of the end of British power in America.



### THE LEXINGTON ALARM LETTER

Compatriots, another April has rolled around marking, as spring does, the beginning of a "new" year. Many of us also think of the revolutionary beginnings of this great country of ours. Others familiar with our history may recall Longfellow's "The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere" and/or Emerson's "The Concord Hymn". But, there's another very important incident which happened that April 19th in 1775, and it's known as the Lexington Alarm Letter. Joseph Palmer was an outstanding



political leader of his day and a member of the Massachusetts Committee of Safety. Upon hearing of the shots fired at Lexington, Palmer wrote the following: *"Watertown Wednesday Morn-*

ing near 10 o'clock. To all the Friends of American Liberty, be it known that this Morning before breake of Day a Brigade consisting of about 1000 or 1200 Men landed at Phip's Farm at Cambridge & marched to Lexington where they found a Company of our Colony Militia in Arms, upon Whom they fired without any Provocation and killed 6 Men and Wounded 4 others. By an Express from Boston this Moment, we find another Brigade are now upon their march from Boston supposed to be about 1000. The Bearer Mr. Israel Bissel is



charged to alarm the Country quite to Connecticut and all Persons are desired to furnish him with Fresh Horses as they may be

needed. I have spoken with Several Persons who have seen the Dead & Wounded. Pray let the Delegates from this Colony to Connecticut see this they know. J. Palmer, one of the Committee of S----y [i.e. Safety]." Israel Bissel then carried this letter on horseback from Watertown, to Norwich, Connecticut, arriving April 20th. The letter was copied at various points along Bissel's route and even-

tually ended being up published in the North Carolina Gazette on May 5th. Colonists had previously used "alarms" in a local manner to rally a community to meet an immediate need.

Historians contend that Palmer's alarm escalated the conflict with the British and that it was this news that caused smoldering tensions to explode into the American War for Independence.

The original Lexington Alarm Letter was in a private collection for 220 years. It then became available for public viewing in the lobby of the Scottish Rite Masonic Museum & Library in Lexington from April 18 - 26, as part of the festivities surrounding Patriots Day, a Massachusetts holiday that commemorates the Battles of Lexington and Concord. However, a reproduction will be on permanent display all other days at the Museum. So if you're ever "Down East", stop in and have a look-see. You'll be glad you did.

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


